Secondary Transfer

The secondary transfer process can be a worrying time for both parents/carers, and children, and possibly more so for children with special educational needs and/or a disability (SEND).

Our aim is to help explain and provide information about the process, give some support and share parental experiences about the process

We will try to make this as clear as possible, and will try to answer any questions that you may have, or signpost you to other agencies for support.

Applying for Secondary Schools

Children **without an EHCP**, go through the usual admissions procedure. Parents should complete the application form in the usual way and children will be offered a place based on the school's published admissions criteria. All school in Harrow receive additional funding to provide extra help for children with SEND.

The process for children who have either a **proposed EHC Plan or Final EHC Plan** looks different to that of other children with SEND.

How the application process works

With an EHCP

- Summer term of Year 5 - annual review held and review paperwork sent to Harrow to be amended ready for consultation process in Autumn term of Year 6. **At this review, you are also asked if you have any preferences for schools and can name them at this point.**
- September of Year 6, you will be contacted by Harrow SENARS (SEN Assessment & Review Service) /Hillingdon SEND Service to confirm your school preferences.
- SENARS will consult with the High School of your choice, and may contact you to discuss other options if necessary.
- You respond directly to Harrow SENARS/Hillingdon SEND Service
- Can include schools from other borough
- May include schools with specialist provision
- You can name private and grammar schools

Without an EHCP

- Apply through the borough in which you live e.g. Harrow or Hillingdon
- Six Choices
- Can include schools from any boroughs Harrow, Hillingdon, Brent etc... (however, EHCPs, Siblings, distance.....)
- Grammar Schools - Barnet, Bucks, Herts (require examinations).
- Faith Schools (will be required to complete and submit a SIF - direct to the school)

Choosing a School

- Wherever possible and appropriate, Harrow looks to place children in their local secondary school. This means that they can transfer with most of their peers from primary school and benefit from being within their local community.
- **You are advised, therefore, to visit your most local secondary school(s).** This will give you the opportunity to meet with the Inclusion Team and discuss your child's needs.
- Only a small number of children, with EHCPs, who have the most complex needs, receive places at a special school or at a mainstream school with special provision.
- Some children may also go to grammar schools or choose a private school.
- Sometimes the deadline for submitting your preferred choices are very close to the High Schools' Open days/evenings - **consider attending the previous year if schools allow this**

Choosing a school

- If your child has an EHCP, you are also advised to visit any schools which you feel will be the most appropriate placement for your child.
 - You are also able to consult with Harrow SENARS about suitable schools.
 - You do have a right to express a preference for any other school, as well as your nearest school.
 - As well as looking at schools in Harrow, if your child has an EHCP, you are also able to name a school within another local authority e.g. Ealing, Hillingdon, Hertfordshire, Brent, Barnet if **there is a school that could best meet your child's needs.**
- If you express a preference for a Voluntary Aided school you will need to complete the school's own admission form to ensure that you meet the criteria for admission to that school. The secondary school will be able to provide you with this form. A list of schools can be found on the Council's website www.harrow.gov.uk
- If you wish to name a private school, you will also need to contact the school directly to find out about their application process.

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How places were offered in 2025

This table shows how places were allocated to children starting at Harrow's secondary schools in September 2025.

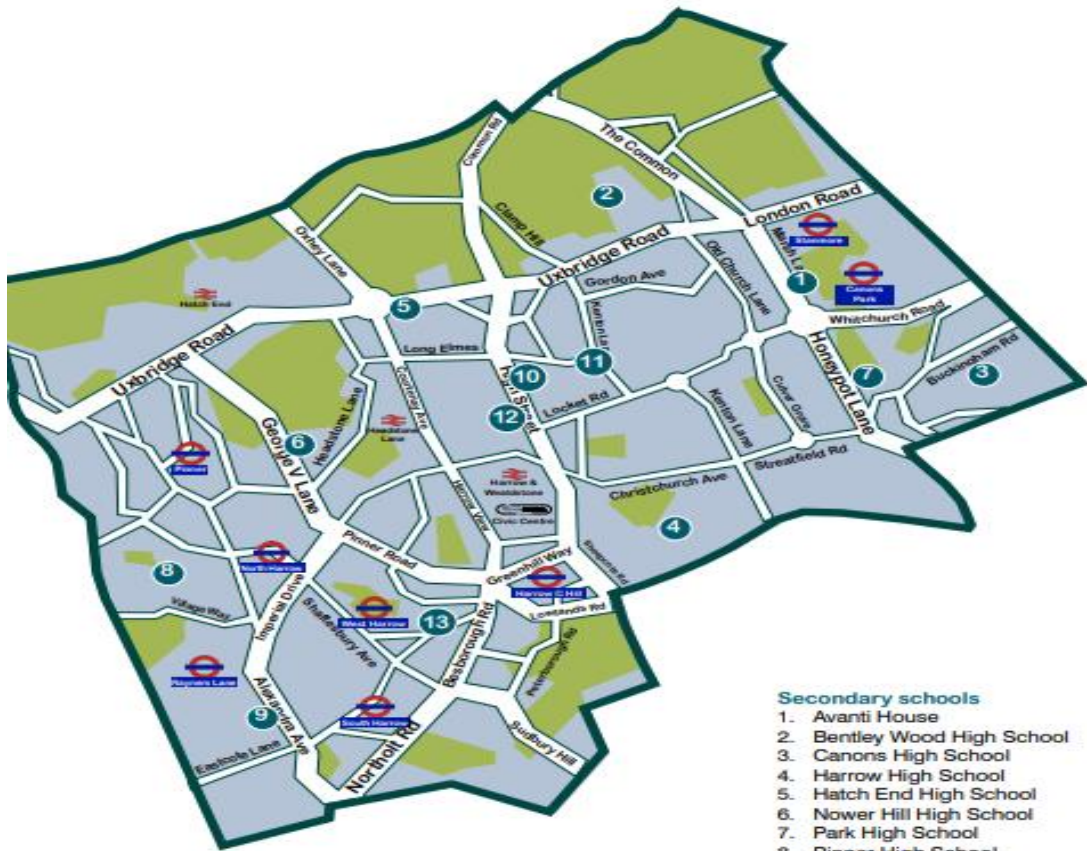
It shows how many places were available, how many people applied for those places and how those places were then allocated.

These are the statistics for last year, and while this year's statistics may be similar, the level and pattern of demand for schools changes every year. This means that the distances cited in the table below change from year to year. Please do not assume that because children in your area attend a particular school that your child will also be offered a place.

Harrow schools do not have catchment areas as part of their admission arrangements¹. Schools in Harrow use distance as part of their admission arrangements. All schools in Harrow measure distances from home to school in a straight line from the home address to the school.

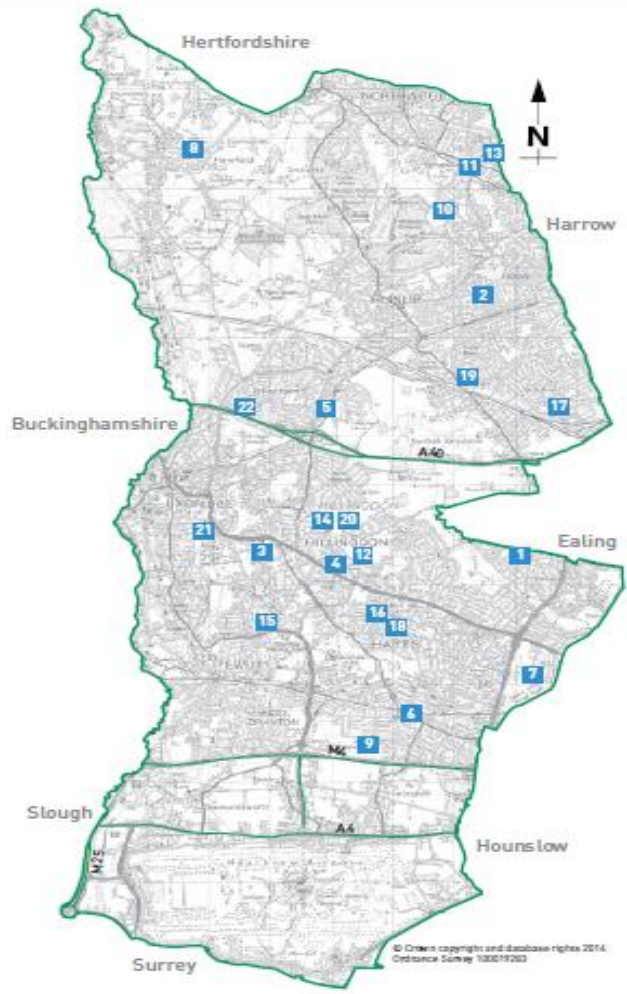

Individual application for each school

Register interest

Apply by 31st Oct

Exams in 1st or 2nd week January

Interviews - end of January/beginning of February

End of February offers made

Tips and Questions you may want to ask when visiting a secondary school

- Prior to your visit to your preferred secondary school, we suggest you get ready a copy of your child's EHCP (last annual review) and/ or any recent information from professionals working with your child. This will allow you to discuss with the Inclusion Team how your child's special educational needs will be met in school.
- Visit the school's website, and in particular take a look at their SEND Information Report and SEND Policy. This will detail all the ways that the schools support children and young people with SEND.
- Download the guide to secondary schools booklet from the Council's website which should be available in the Autumn term www.harrow.gov.uk
- A copy of the school's own prospectus will describe out-of-school based activities and whether the school operates an after-school or breakfast club.
- You may find it helpful to talk to other parents/carers whose children attend the same secondary school.

Tips and Questions you may want to ask when visiting a secondary school

- Ask if your child will have an opportunity to visit/spend time at the school prior to starting in September.
- Ask how the school supports pupils with SEN. Do they have different support assistants for different subjects? Is there an SEN 'hub' pupils can access? How are interventions made available to pupils in their school?
- Does the school operate a 'buddy' system for those children who would benefit from a friend at break and lunchtime periods and/or finding their way around school? What else do the school do to help children find their way around the school between lesson time?
- You may want to know about the school's behaviour policy. The school's governing body publish a policy detailing their approach to behaviour. It should include the school's approach to discipline, what types of behaviour would lead to exclusion and how the school deals with bullying.

Can Harrow Council guarantee updated EHCPs in time for application for secondary school?

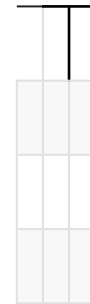
All EHCPs have to be produced by February 14th/15th
